2. Autism and Alcohol Use

<u>The Society for the Study of Addiction</u> have produced <u>two-part podcast</u> on autism and addiction with contributors Professors Julia Sinclair and Sam Chamberlain, and Dr Janine Robinson and Chris Torry - who are part of the Society for the Study of Addiction's <u>SABAA: Substance use</u>, <u>Alcohol and Behavioural Addictions in Autism</u>



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3. Enhance The UK

Anyone can experience physical, emotional or sexual abuse. <u>But research shows that disabled</u> <u>people may be more at risk of experiencing violence, bullying or controlling behaviour</u>. Neurodiverse people also have higher risks of experiencing sexual violence. This may be a result of difficulty negotiating social cues, a strong desire to be accepted, or not understanding consent.

A <u>study reported</u> that 70% of adults with autism spectrum conditions (ASC) reported experiencing some forms of sexual victimisation after they turned 14 and into adulthood, compared to 45% of adults without ASC. Yet despite all this, there is a lack of awareness around the impact of sexual violence on disabled people.

The abuse may happen through a relationship or it could be inflicted by a person who a disabled person relies on for care or assistance. Due to a lack of healthy sex education, sometimes people may not understand that they are experiencing sexual violence.

Abusers may use threats, cohesion or gaslighting, which can make situations more confusing. Understanding the role of consent is vital, although some disabilities can make it difficult to communicate feeling uncomfortable, or to withdraw consent. It can also be much harder for disabled people to report abuse.

They may face challenges in accessing services to make a report, or their abuser may remove communication tools they need to be able to get help. It can be difficult to know where you can go to access help or report a sexual violence crime. There is also less awareness around where to find support groups or networks. Enhance the UK aims to highlight this issue and raise awareness of where people can go to access help and the impact of sexual violence on disabled people.

7. Safer Cheshire East Partnership – Annual Report 2022-23

The Safer Cheshire East Partnership (SCEP) has a statutory responsibility for Community Safety across Cheshire East. Partners of SCEP include the Police, Fire, Health, Probation, Council and the voluntary sector to provide a strategic approach to reduce levels of crime and increase public reassurance.

The Annual Report provides information on the key duties of SCEP including, how key priorities including Domestic Abuse, Violence Against Women and Girls, Road Safety, Fraud and Serious





Organised Crime have been identified and more importantly how partner agencies are working collectively to address these and other community safety issues.

The SCEP Annual Report, highlights the responsibilities and work of the various sub-groups of SCEP each designed to specialise in addressing priority themes. Evidence is also provided on how the allocation of annual funding obtained through the Police and Crime Commissioners office is distributed to partners with information on how the delivery directly impacts on specific community safety concerns.

The Report is the first of its kind produced, with members keen to raise the profile of SCEP demonstrate Cheshire East Council is actively working closely with partners to make Cheshire East a safer place to both live and work.

8. Knife Angel

Knife Crime has become a national concern and been identified as a priority for Police and partners for Cheshire East. This has resulted in a focus been placed on Crewe to host Knife Angel in May 2023. The emotive sculpture is formed of 100,000 knives all collected via a national knife amnesty and will be on display in Crewe throughout the campaign being scheduled for May 2023.

Over the past two years the <u>Knife Angel</u> has toured the UK raising awareness of violence, aggression and knife crime. It has proved to be a catalyst for meaningful engagement, dispelling myths, strengthening community relationships with police and agencies, and driving forward a step change.

Planning is well under way with partners from Crewe Town Council, Cheshire East Council, local community groups, businesses, charities along with other partner agencies to develop and deliver a programme of intensive activity over a 28-day period. Schools across Crewe will be heavily involved to engage in programmes bespoke to the Crewe community addressing 'knife crime' together with a comprehensive process of evaluation.

9. Training Update

Working in partnership with colleagues from Cheshire East Licensing department the Boards trainers have developed a level 1 Adult and Children's Safeguarding awareness session. Working in partnership with colleagues from Cheshire East Licensing department the Boards trainers have developed a level 1 Adult and Children's Safeguarding awareness session. Following a change in November 2022 it is now mandatory for all licensed drivers to undertake the training before renewal of their licence and for all new applicants to have undertaken it as a condition of obtaining a licence.

Sessions have been held in Crewe and Macclesfield and more are to be scheduled throughout the coming year.

10. Health and Social Care Courses at Keele University

<u>The School of Law at Keele</u> offers a range of MA programmes designed for health or social care professionals, including an <u>MA in Safeguarding Adults: Law, Policy, and Practice</u>, an <u>MA in</u> <u>Advanced Social Care Law</u>, and an <u>MA in Child Care Law and Practice</u>.
